Dear Parents, Pupils and Friends,

What an experience these last few months have been!

Covid 19 brought the Easter term to an abrupt end. Thankfully our boarders were able to return home in time, just before each country closed its borders. Who would have thought borders could close in our globalist 21st century?

In anticipation of a prolonged lockdown, the last Senior school assembly was dedicated to learning how to use Google Classrooms. This allowed the school to continue teaching, albeit in a virtual classroom environment. Pupils were excited and enthusiastic about the new style of learning. Three months on, I think the experience has been a very successful one. The learning pace slows, but does not stop, and pupils are able to progress in their knowledge and learning. It has been very interesting to observe certain, sometimes weaker, pupils overtake their peers with these new learning methods which call for more autonomy and responsibility. Despite the downside of working and communicating in a virtual environment, almost all pupils were able to take possession of their academic work and organize themselves successfully. It has been very pleasing to watch them grow in maturity in this regard.

The primary school returned to class in April. The small pupil numbers and vast space around the campus made for easier social distancing. Throughout lockdown, the children's teachers had kept in touch with their pupils, with work flowing back and forth between families and teachers. Returning to school was easy.

June was quite a special time for our primary school, who took full possession of the school campus in the absence of the Senior school. They enjoyed many a picnic outside, and the new trend of social distancing was easy to maintain. Keeping the classes in separate groups for most of the day meant that the children in each class group bonded more tightly than ever. What a blessing for our children to have been able to return to school in a normal fashion and complete the year with as little disruption as possible. God really has blessed us with a school like St. Michael's!

The end of this school year sees the departure of our year 11 pupils. It is a very great shame that they were not able to sit their GCSE exams as normal and then celebrate the end of their tenure at St. Michael's. The teachers worked very hard to assemble and submit to the various examination boards all the information necessary to allow the boards to award the final grades. The school remains on alert in case more information is required for a particular pupil in a particular subject.

I am very pleased and grateful to all members of our school community - staff, pupils and parents - for having pulled together and allowed the school to continue during the long months of closure and despite a media storm of alarm and foreboding. We have shown wonderful resilience and team spirit. There will be some catch-up to do in September for lost time and classroom opportunity, but with our small classes and determined spirit, I am confident that pupils will very quickly resume their normal levels of progress.




We have also hung in the refectory a "Commendations" board which will cite the annual winners of prizes and colours.



hen we first acquired the school property in 1991, the poor condition of the gym bathrooms was already a point of discussion. Shortly after, the bathrooms were closed off and the room was henceforth used as a changing room only. All that is now remedied! Our maintenance team assembled and installed the new fixtures originally at HighGrange: sinks, toilets, showers and two urinals that all sit on a new floor. Everything has been arranged for easy cleaning! Thank you to our benefactors who helped us complete this very longstanding project.



The corridors of Lancaster Hall (dormitory building) have received a fresh coat of paint.

The Walsingham Hall (A level block) renovations are almost complete. The new flooring and fresh paint make a world of difference. The shower room has also undergone a major overhaul. All these works have been done in-house.

The classroom doors are now all repaired and in good working order. It is now possible to close and lock them!

Thanks to two fallen oaks and many man hours, we have enough firewood to last until the next millennium.

The water mains burst ... for the second time in 2 months! We now have an ugly pile of earth along the driveway. We managed to find and repair the leaks, but we have requested quotes for a new pipe. The present one is rusted and old. It is looking to be an expensive business, in the range of £10K. St. Philomena, pray for us!


